
If you have a medium-sized, well-behaved dog you would like us to consider, please send your contact information and a photo of your dog via email to emersonstage@emerson.edu.

Music and More at Trinity Church

During the chilly days of midwinter, it's important to get outside and stretch your legs—but it's also nice to have an indoor destination at the end of your walk. If you haven't yet been to Trinity Church in Copley Square, now is the perfect time to visit, whatever your religious affiliation.

Constructed in the 1870s, Trinity's imposing building features numerous stained glass windows, including several by the American artist John LaFarge. LaFarge's innovative technique of layering opalescent glass allowed him to create new effects of color and

shading. Several premier English glass workshops worked on Trinity's windows. The building's interior also includes painted murals and other decoration, and the sanctuary's design is distinctive. Trinity can be explored either through daily guided tours or a self-guided tour. Both types of tour cost \$7 and include an informative map.

If music interests you more than architecture, go to Trinity for a Friday concert. Every Friday this spring at 12:15 pm, a different organist will give a recital on one of the church's two magnificent organs. There is no charge, but the church suggests a donation of \$10.

After your tour or concert, head downstairs to browse the Shop at Trinity, which offers a wide selection of books, music, and art dealing with religion and spirituality, as well as handmade items by local artists and craftspeople.
